

[Blackstone, Hell on Wheels win big at Alberta Film and Television Awards](#)

There was a plea for better roles for native actors, lots of nostalgia for the salad days of the Alberta film industry, music from the 1970s and even a hairy streaker to end the evening on a surreal note.

But, for the most part, the Alberta Film and Television Awards didn't hold too many surprises on its return to Calgary for its 40th anniversary at the Telus Convention Centre to honour homegrown productions and film workers, with two of the province's most established shows coming out on top. AMC's gritty western *Hell on Wheels* and APTN's even grittier drama *Blackstone* were the big winners, earning five and six trophies respectively in various categories.

Hell on Wheels, from Calgary-based Nomadic Pictures, took the prize for best dramatic series, beating out CBC's *Heartland* and *Blackstone*. The Edmonton-shot *Freezer*, a thriller starring Dylan McDermott, picked up the win for best feature film.

Other notable winners included Calgary actress Michelle Thrush, who picked up her second Rosie for her acclaimed performance as Gail Stoney in *Blackstone*. After her thank-yous, Thrush took the opportunity to

make a direct plea to Alberta producers in the audience to cast native actors and actresses as “human beings.”

“I’ve been in this business for close to 25 years working professionally as an actor,” Thrush told the Herald after the ceremony. “And I think we’re beyond the time to start casting aboriginal actors as just human beings. I am so tired every time there is a native character guest starring or a native character here or there they call us in. I want to come in and read for people who are just doing whatever and it has nothing to do with the culture I’m a part of. I’m an actress who just happens to be aboriginal.”

Blackstone, currently shooting its fourth season outside of Edmonton, tells the often harrowing story of corruption, power and addiction on a First Nations Reserve. It took home an impressive haul of hardware this year. Alongside the win for Thrush, creator Ron E. Scott was honoured in directing and screenwriting categories while Mike Shields also won two awards, for his soundtrack work in both the series and a The Making of Blackstone documentary. The show was also awarded the prize for the production that best reflects cultural diversity.

Scott says he takes pride in the series’ ability to inspire natives both in and out of the entertainment industry.

“We’re inspiring this next generation to say ‘We can do that,’” he says. “We hire actors, we train them and we try to do our best. It’s something I’m really proud of.”

Drayton Valley native Jason Cermak took home the best actor prize for his work in the tender, Lethbridge-shot family film Common Chord, beating out Tiny Plastic Men’s Chris Craddock, Kevin Davey from Hell on Wheels, Sheldon Elter from Blackstone and Heartland’s Shaun Johnston. Although that was the film’s only win, it earned an impressive seven nominations with its story about a musician forced to come of age when the mother of his young daughter is killed.

“It’s a very mature, intelligent script and a really beautiful character,” Cermak says.

The actor, who is currently shooting the sci-fi apocalyptic thriller Fallout Asylum near Calgary, lives in Vancouver where he recently scored a small role in the much ballyhooed film adaptation of 50 Shades of Grey. He says he hopes the new Calgary film studio, set to open in 2015, means that Alberta actors can stay home and have a career.

“If I live in Vancouver, I can work in Calgary,” he says. “But it doesn’t work the other way. For some reason, if you’re a Calgary-based actor they don’t hire you in Vancouver. So I’m going out there and making a name for myself and coming back every chance I get. As soon as I get enough clout there I’m going to come back to Calgary to stay.”

Speaking of Calgary, this is the third year in a row that Hell on Wheels won for best series. It also picked up wins for Bridget Durnford in editing, Frank Laratta and Michael Playfair for overall sound, Carol Case for costume design and Sharon Toohey for best make-up. It begins shooting its fourth season next week near Okotoks.

“Everybody is so passionate about it,” says producer Mike Frislev of Nomadic Pictures. “We’re just really, really proud to be part of it. I mean, we engineer a railroad every year. It’s kind of interesting. It’s a big story.”

Meanwhile, the Edmonton-produced Survival of the Fabulous, a funny documentary about the science behind homosexuality, was awarded three trophies, including wins for best documentary over 30 minutes and in cinematography and editing.

Calgary’s Pyramid Productions took the win for best documentary series for Wild Obsession, which airs on Animal Planet.

The evening, which was hosted by comedian Sean Cullen, had a distinct air of nostalgia to it to celebrate the Rosies' 40th anniversary. Music from 1974 was blared between awards while filmed testimonials about the early years of film industry came from veterans such as animal wrangler and stuntman John Scott, Edmonton documentary filmmaker Tom Radford, cameraman Jim Trustian and wildlife filmmaker Albert Karvonen. Radford, who won the first Rosie in 1974 for his documentary Ernest Brown: Pioneer Photographer, was joined on stage by Horst Schmid, Alberta's first minister of culture.

Cullen struggled to keep the crowd's interest throughout the evening ("How's the salad? It seems have gotten you nice and quiet . . . and unresponsive. What did they put in the salad, sadness juice?") only to be upstaged at the end of the night by a presumably liquor-lubricated stalker. It may or may not have been an homage to the infamous Oscars stalker of 1974 who interrupted actor David Niven, but Alberta Media Production Industries Association executive director Bill Evans insisted it was not a planned part of the evening's entertainment.

"I don't know where that came from," he said. "No idea."
